PRESIDENT'S REPORT HEADING INTO SPRING

Dear Members, I am pleased to note the increasing return to normality in many sections of our State's socioeconomic sectors.

The Leighton Tunnel tours for the public remain suspended due to the fact that the complex comprises small rooms connected by narrow passage ways. Our earlier tours were of up to 13 people escorted by a Guide- in light of the S.D. rules we cannot have that arrangement now. A sub section of the Committee is now investigating alternative ways of having visitors enjoy our display efforts. The Committee has decided to re-open the tun-

nels in early November- pending Phase 5.

Regarding R.A.A.H.S. occupying ground at Irwin Barracks. We have enjoyed the use of a workshop and annex building since the early 1990's. Defence has now offered us a formal Licence arrangement for continued use of those two structures. The Committee has evaluated it, (with thanks to Don and Stan), as has member Tom Darbyshire, and I signed off on it in September.

The workshop to-day is only permitted to do light weight mechanical work- but in the day- our members did excellent re-builds of field guns and mortars. One of the skilled artisans is member Harvey Everett who worked wonders at his lathe- I am delighted that he has recently accepted Honorary Membership status within the Society.

Various Committee members are already arranging how our interior plans can be started. Certain tasks will be done by our busy bee workers – which will save costs and maintain their interest, and other more complicated tasks by contracted specialists.

Building work on the entrance doorway concluded at the end of September- the unsightly wire safety screen has been removed. The T.O.M.P. elected to use 'heritage bricks,' which we may seek permission to paint when finished, so the structure matches the 1940's 6" entrance nearby.

The RAN has agreed to supply the Society with twenty five 5" brass cartridge cases, which will be altered to replicate 5.25" cases, and which will appear as display items in the gun floor alcoves. The cases were compliments of HMAS ANZAC's main battery shoot at Lancelin earlier this year .They will be stored in the C.P. until required in the ammunition alcoves. The first Busy Bee in several months encouraged an excellent turnout of members who dealt with a range of tasks above and below ground. I paused in my task (painting!), to admire the fabulous view westwards towards Rottnest and the coastline to the north and south. It brought home to me just how fortunate the public are to have this piece of high ground available to visit and be educated about our military history.

In September we made the tunnels complex available to Curtin University staff and students for the purpose of their annual Mine Surveying Field Camp. A local newspaper was invited down to interview the team leader Mr Tony Snow and your RAAHS President.

Also invited to use the tunnels and 5.25" C.P. was the annual International Scouting movements radio communications hub- this was a sleep- over event, involving supervising adults and lots of young techsavvy teenagers! Their communications interacted

A sub-committee has also commenced the reformatting of the 6" shell store. The new arrangement will be more representative of that storeroom's original function. A feature will be an enlargement of a photo that shows rows of H.E. and A.P. shells being attended to by a serviceman. Also on-show will be a set of projectiles, photos of the weapons that fired them and floor painted shell symbols to show visitors the deliberate man-

ner in which those objects were stored.

with a world-wide audience.

Early in September, Council contractors commenced work on removal of obstructing vegetation west of our gun floors. All leaf litter was chipped and low height ground cover native vegetation was planted. The result is just what we required.(Photos of the war time 6" site under construction show a hot and windy locale!)

A HAIG OF BEMERSIDE

Douglas Haig was of Fife parentage, and more remotely of Border descent. He was born on 8 June 1861, at 24, Charlotte Square, Edinburgh, the son of Mr. John Haig, of Cameron Bridge, of Rachel, daughter of Mr. Hugh Veitch, of Stewartfield, Midlothian.

The boy, who was destined to become one of the greatest figures in his country sprang from a race of fighters, for he was collaterally descended from the Haigs of Bemersyde whose pedigree had early Norman roots, and it has been claimed that the family was of even more venerable origin, dating back to the Picts. There are written records that Haigs were living on Tweedside before the thirteenth century, when Petrus de Haga (1150-1200) was the head of family, who died when William the Lion was on the throne. A de Haga enlisted under Richard I for the Third Crusade.

Tyde what may betide- - - Haig shall be Haig of Bemersyde."

GORDON THOMAS HULL 12.04.1922 - 24.03.2020

The RAA Association and the Historical Society was notified by his daughter Lynette that Gordon had passed away on 24th March 2020.

At the time of his passing Gordon was still serving as the State President of the 116 Light Anti – Aircraft Association, an appointment he had held for many years. The LAA Association was linked with the Society as one of the WW2 Ex Service Organisations which gave generously of their members' time in the development of Leighton Battery Heritage Site and indeed, on numerous occasions assisted the Society through financial donation.

In recognition of their support, a restored 40mm BOFORS MK1 LAA Gun was presented to Gordon as President of the 116 LAA by the Society and it was transferred to Rottnest Island where it is paraded each ANZAC Day and Remembrance Day.

Gordon was a fine gentleman. He is survived by his widow Florence and Daughter Lynette.

THE AUSTRALIAN ARMY AT A GLANCE

little frivolity:- A friend once told me he didn't understand the military system. Dumb civilian, I said to myself, but openly I said, "The system is really quite simple."

You see, all people in the Army are soldiers, all privates are soldiers, but not all soldiers are privates. Some are officers who are commissioned, but some are officers who are not commissioned. Obviously if every private was called private it would be confusing, so some privates are called things like trooper, driver, gunner, craftsman, sapper or signaller. Not all of the drivers actually drive because some of them cook, but we don't call them cooks, for that matter, not all drivers are called drivers – some of them are privates or gunners. Gunners as I'm sure you know are the blokes that fire guns, unless of course they are drivers or signallers in which case we call them gunners rather than drivers or signallers just to make it clearer. All gunners belong to the artillery, except that in the infantry we have gunners who are called privates because they fire a different sort of gun, for the same reason we call our drivers and signallers private as well.

A Lance Corporal is called Corporal, unless he is a Lance Bombardier then we call him Bombardier to distinguish him from a full Bombardier, who is just like a Corporal. All other ranks are called by their rank for the sake of simplicity except that Staff Sergeants are called Staff, but they are not on the staff, some Warrant Officers, who are not officers, are called Sergeant Major although they are not Sergeants or Majors. Some Warrant Officers are called Mister which is the same thing that we call some officers but they are not Warrant Officers. A Lieutenant is also called Mister because they are subalterns, but we always write their rank as Lieutenant or Second Lieutenant, and second comes before first. When we talk about groups of soldiers there obviously has to be clear distinction. We call them Officers and Soldiers although we know that officers are soldiers too, sometimes we talk about officers and other ranks which is the same as calling them soldiers. I guess it is easiest when we talk about rank and file which is all the troops on parade except the officers and some of the NCOs - - and a few of the privates – and the term is used whether everyone is on parade or not.

A large unit is called a battalion, unless it is a regiment but sometimes a regiment is much bigger than a battalion and then it has nothing to do with the other sort of regiment. Sub units are called companies unless they are squadrons or troops or batteries for that matter. That is not radio batteries and don't confuse this type of troop with the type who are soldiers but not officers.

Mostly the Army is divided into Corps as well as units, not the sort of Corps which is a couple of divisions but the sort which tells you straight away what trade each man performs, whether he is a tradesmen or not. The Infantry Corps has all the infantrymen for example and the Artillery Corps has all the gunners. Both these Corps also have signallers and drivers except those who are in the Signals or Transport Corps. In fact the Signals Corps is not a service at all because it is an Arm. Arms do all the fighting, although Signals don't have to fight too much, rather like the Engineers who are also an Arm but they don't fight too much either So you see, it's really quite simple .

And some choose to disregard that, which many believe, to be an evident truth.

ar changes men's natures. The barbarities of war are seldom committed by abnormal men. The tragedy of war is that these horrors are committed by normal men, in situations in which the ebb and flow of normal life have departed and been replaced by a constant round of fear and anger and blood and death. Soldiers at war are not to be judged by civilian rules.

Garry Sheean VC

On 29 November Armidale sailed for Japanese-occupied Timor—in company with the corvette H.M.A.S. Castlemaine—to withdraw the exhausted Australian 2nd/2nd Independent shortly before 2 p.m. on I December 1942 Armidale, by then separated from Kuru, was attacked by no less than thirteen aircraft. The corvette manoeuvred frantically. At 3.15 a torpedo struck her port side and another hit the engineering spaces; finally a bomb struck aft. As the vessel listed heavily to port, the order was given to abandon ship. The survivors leapt into the sea and were machine-gunned by the Japanese. Once he had helped to free a life-raft, Sheean scrambled back to his gun on the sinking ship. Although wounded in the chest and back, the 18-year-old sailor shot down one bomber and kept other aircraft away from his comrades in the water. He was seen still firing his gun as Armidale slipped below the waves. Only forty-nine of the 149 souls who had been on board survived the sinking and the ensuing days in life-rafts. Gary Sheean was mentioned in dispatches for his bravery. In 2020 he became Australia's 101st recipient of the Victoria Cross, the first-to be awarded to a member of the R.A.N. An A Collins-class submarine, which launched in 1999, was named after him—the only ship in the R.A.N. to bear the name of an ordinary seaman.

LEIGHTON BATTERY HERITAGE SITE – 5.25 INCH GUN EMPLACEMENT PROJECT



ow that the Emplacement has been roofed and the Stairwell leading to the underground complex secured, Vice President Graham McKenzie-Smith has compiled a detailed development plan identifying the staged projects to convert the facility into a further tourist destination for visitors to examine having concluded their Tunnels Tour.

The plan embraces photographic displays for the Engine Room, the Plotting Room and the Store Room. The ammunition recesses surrounding the Gun Pedestal will contain artefacts relative to the dual role the Battery played as part of Fortress Fremantle's Air and Coast Defence.

To complete the interpretation, a replica Turret and Barrel has already been approved to be mounted on the concrete roof of the emplacement.

The development plan has been submitted to the Town of Mosman Park seeking their comment and support for the project.

Fully costed, the total outlay is \$200,000 a portion of which will be funded by the Society in both cash and kind. Approaches will made to LotteryWest after they resume such funding in the New Year.
